- Participating in decisions about services, placement, and support










Top 3 Mistakes Parents Make (and How to Avoid Them)



- Staying Silent When You're Confused
 Ask for clarification. You're allowed to pause meeting.
 - Not Preparing Ahead of Time
 Review data and bring notes with specific concerns.
 - Signing Without Fully Understanding
 You can take time to review the IEP before signing.
 It's your right.

- 5. What is the plan if my child isn't making expected progress?








